

CHURCH DEDICATION IN ROSEVILLE.

The New Edifice of the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church Will Be Formally Opened This Week.

The new edifice of the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church, at Fifth and Roseville avenues is to be dedicated this week. The dedication proper will take place on Wednesday evening, and special services will be held on Thursday evening and next Sunday. Wednesday's exercises will open with an organ recital at 7.20. Then will come the dedication, at 7.45, at which addresses will be made by Rev. Dr. Charles L. Haley, Rev. Davis W. Lusk, Rev. George A. Paull and Rev. Thomas R. The new church, which is modern in every respect, cost \$50,000, and has a seating capacity of 500. One of its features is a handsome memorial window donated by Mr. and Mrs. Robert Craft, in memory of their daughter, Helen.

The Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church was organized in 1889. Land was bought by the Church Extension Society, which erected a chapel in 1889. In the Fall of 1899 ground was broken for the new church. About \$1,000 for the building fund was collected by the Ladies' Aid So-
